## ASCLS and ASCP Choosing Wisely Recommendations



- Don't repeat HbA1c testing within 3 months of a previous result.
- Don't perform an extensive work-up in otherwise healthy neutropenic patients of African or Middle Eastern ancestry prior to Duffy-null phenotype testing.
- Don't order ANA and ENA unless the patient is suspected to have a connective tissue disease.
- Do not measure the INR in patients who are taking an anti-Xa inhibitor.
- Don't employ a specific direct oral anticoagulant [DOAC] reversal agent without identifying the DOAC and estimating its plasma concentration.

## ASCLS, ASCP and ASM Choosing Wisely Recommendations



- Do not routinely send urine for *Chlamydia trachomatis* and *Neisseria gonorrhoeae* (CT/NG) testing from females if vaginal swab collection is possible.
- Do not perform heterophile antibody (monospot) testing to diagnose acute EBV infection in children less than 5 years of age.
- Do not test for influenza unless the patient is symptomatic and the result will influence clinical management and decision making.
- Do not prescribe immune suppressive agents for suspected autoimmune hepatitis (AIH) without first excluding hepatotropic virus infections (e.g., viral hepatitis A, B, and C). Viral hepatitis may mimic AIH, both serologically and histologically, features that may resolve with direct-acting antiviral (DAA) treatment.
- Don't order tissue transglutaminase IgG antibody or Deamidated Gliadin Peptide (DGP) antibodies (IgG or IgA) in the initial screening for Celiac Disease.

ASCLS Mid-Year Report: Recap of Clinical Laboratory Legislative and Workforce Issues for 2022-2023

The Mid-Year ASCLS House of Delegates meeting was held on Sunday, January 15 th. Jim Flanigan, Executive Vice President of ASCLS, discussed the legislative landscape and workforce challenges for the Clinical Laboratory profession at years end for 2022 and what to expect in 2023.

#### PAMA ACT

The Protecting Access to Medicare Act (PAMA) act which mandates cuts to the laboratory fee schedules was delayed again by Congress by the passage of the Consolidated Appropriations Act for Fiscal year 2023. This act included a one-year delay in laboratory testing fee cuts and obligations for reporting. There will be no cuts to Medicare payments for laboratory diagnostic testing through 2023. The next scheduled reporting period is scheduled for January 1, 2024. Jim indicated that if the PAMA act had gone into effect in 2023, laboratories would face a 15-percent cut in payments for the top 25- clinical lab tests. Overall Medicare spending has increased 17 percent since 2021, largely due to COVID-19, genetic, and chemistry testing. The Medicare Payment Advisory Commission (MedPAC) recommends that sampling a wider range of laboratory organizations would produce more accurate laboratory testing rates with less impact on the clinical laboratory fee schedule. The delay in cuts under PAMA is a short-term win for the laboratory community. However, the postponement of the PAMA fee cuts does not address the reform required to fix the methodology used to determine laboratory reimbursement fees going into 2024.

#### SALSA ACT

The implementation of the PAMA act in 2014 has put laboratories on an unsustainable path of continued year-to-year Medicare reimbursement fee schedule cuts. The Savings Access to Laboratory Service ACT (SALSA) was proposed to correct the methodology used to set laboratory fees under PAMA. The SALSA act would require that CMS use a statistically representative sampling of the laboratory market to determine Medicare's Clinical Laboratory Fee Schedule (CLFS). The SALSA act would also implement guardrails on annual increases and decreases to the fee schedule and increase the time between reporting periods to mitigate the 'shock' to the system by creating more stability in fee changes. The SALSA act is a bipartisan bill still pending in Congress for 2023. Jim encourages ASCLS constituent members to support the 'Stop the Cut's campaign by posting to social media and urging Congress to enact the SALSA act.


- ~ Decorate Your Lab Entrance with a door decorating contest.

### 2022 Review

- PAMA Cuts tabled again, on the horizon for early 2024 to be introduced for a 3rd time.

## Legislative Updates

#### **VALID ACT**

The Verifying Accurate Leading-edge IVCT Development (VALID Act) is described by Jim as a complex bill that has been under discussion for many years in Congress. The VALID Act would create a new category of 'in-vitro' clinical tests (IVCTs) that includes commercial kits and laboratory-developed tests (LDTs) using a risk-based framework that would be overseen by the FDA. The VALID Act is still pending in congress. Robert Califf M.D., the current Commissioner of the FDA, is considering regulating LDTs under its rule-making process if Congress fails to pass the VALID Act.

#### **LABORATORY LABOR SHORTAGES**

In 2022, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) suggest that nursing degree holders should perform high-to-moderate complexity testing to decrease the burden on laboratory labor shortages. Many clinical laboratory associations continue to oppose this change to CLIA that would allow nurses to be equivalent to Clinical Laboratory Scientists (CLS).

Additionally, CMS is considering a rule change under CLIA for Doctor of Clinical Laboratory Sciences as a qualifying degree as a Laboratory Director for high- complexity testing. The ASCLS supports this change to CLIA rules and has a position paper that describes the DCLS role and responsibilities.

Jim also discussed Title VII and VIII funding updates in Congress. The FY 2023 Omnibus budget approved an allocation of \$880 million which represents a 10% increase from 2022. The budget increase includes a 12% increase for Health Professionals and a 10% increase for Nursing programs. However, the laboratory profession is not specifically called out in the overall budget for receiving Title VIII or Title VIII funding.

To address laboratory workforce shortfalls, the Bio Preparedness Workforce Act pending bill in Congress would establish a new loan repayment program for health professionals who spend at least 3 years of their time working in bio- preparedness and infectious diseases in underserved areas. In addition, a federal grant program would be created to assist allied schools in recruiting and retaining clinical laboratory students with funding for attracting faculty for these schools. ASCLS has drafted a proposal that supports a \$25 million allocation for student loan repayments and a \$25 million grant for clinical laboratory science programs. Jim concluded his discussion of laboratory congressional bills and laboratory workforce challenges by encouraging all ASLCS members to continue to advocate for laboratory issues. Jim emphasized the importance of laboratory advocation with this quote from Lili Tomlin, "I always thought someone should do something about that...then I real zed I am somebody."
